2. <u>Goals:</u>

- b. Engage: Provide diverse programming for the various interests of our alumni that foster the spirit of camaraderie based on region, interests, profession, degree or identity
- c. Promote: Encourage the culture of "Bobcats helping Bobcats" by hiring students and alumni, along with supporting UC Merced traditions and initiatives
- d. Serve: Support current students by providing scholarships, mentoring, internships and career advancement opportunities. Additionally, provide volunteer opportunities for alumni to serve on leadership board and constituency committees.

3. How to Charter a Constituency Group:

- a. Alumni constituencies generally begin with a small group of dedicated alumni. A group can provide
 many different opportunities, including serving as a social outlet for Bobcats and friends of
 UC Merced, providing networking and professional development opportunities for alumni and current
 students, as well as creating pride and awareness among peers.
- b. Groups can be formed in 2 ways:
 - i. A group of UC Merced alumni take the initiative
 - ii. UCMAA establishes a group based on data and consistent interest

- Nicole Carlotto, Director of Communications & Advocay, UC Office of Federal Government Relations (FGR)
 - UC FGR serves as UC's liaison with the federal government (Congress, the Administration, Federal Agencies)
 - UC Advocacy Network
 - 1. A community of people who speak out on behalf of UC and its federal and state priories to help advance the University's mission (research, education, healthcare, and public service)
 - 2. UC's grassroots program that leverages digital platforms to provide opportunities for advocates to connect with their legislators through emails, phone calls, petitions, pledges and social media

 - 4. Goals
- a. Provide opportunities to help educate legislators on the UC's priorities, needs, and challenges.
- B. Want to influence budget and legislative processes

- Double the Pell
 - 1. <u>Pell Grants:</u> The primary way that the federal government helps low-income students afford college. At UC Merced, more than 60% of undergrads are Pell Grant recipients the highest amongst the UCs.
 - 2. <u>Declining Value:</u> In 1980, Pell Grants covered more than 75% of the cost to attend a 4-year public university .

 Today, the maximum Pell Grant award covers around 28%
 - 3. <u>The Ask:</u> Restore the purchasing power of Pell Grants by doubling the amount of the maximum award so that it reaches \$13,000 and then indexing the grants to inflation
 - 4. The Pell turns 50 on June 30; will be launching a campaign to highlight the impact of Pell Grants through alumni highlights from each campus
- Open Discussion:
 - 1. Katrina: Where do the funds for the Pell Grant come from?
 - * Nicole to research information and follow up through JaeJae
 - 2. How are students impacted through cost of living and cost of attendance?
 - a. Nicole: The grant's amount is not going as far as it once did; Receiving more funds for the Pell could also lead to expanded institutional aid for students
 - 3. Brooklynn: Do you believe there are issues with the eligibility and access to the Pell Grant from a demographic perspective?
 - * Nicole to circle back
 - 4. Keith: Additional support is needed across institutional support (i.e. Pell Grant, Cal Grant, scholarships)



UC BOARD OF REGENTS REPORT

- Sandra Timmons, Alumni Regent-Designate
 - Multi-Year Tuition & Financial Aid Plan:
 - 1. In 2021, the Regents approved an increase in tuition because of issues such as:
 - a. A worsening student to faculty ratio
 - b. With staff and faculty support not keeping pace with student enrollment growth
 - c. A declining number of students able to enroll in their first-choice major, and the UC
 - d. Cannot attract ladder-rank faculty because of noncompetitive salaries
 - 2. The Regents approved a multi-year tuition stability plan for three systemwide student charges: tuition, the Student Services Fee (SSF), and Nonresident Supplemental Tuition (NRST)
 - a. Entering freshen have the same tuition for 6 years
 - b. Transfer students for a total of 6 academic years
 - c. Uses three year rolling average to determine inflation (capped at 5%)
 - d. Will direct 45% of all new base tuition revenues toward lower and middle-income California undergraduates as aid, an increase from the current 33%
 - e. Second time UC has increased in-state tuition in 10 years
 - Open Discussion:
 - 1. Liz: What benefits can students see because of the increase, as it relates to the factor of student-faculty ratio?
 - a. Regent Timmons: Smaller class size, being able to access majors, and the a ramp up of student services from they stand now. The goal is to allow students to succeed in a timely manner, hopefully within a 5-year time period. As well as faculty stability if they see an increase in salaries. Most students under the 140K are not going to feel the impact because of the return to aid that will support them in other ways.
 - 2. Brooklynn: Is the overall cost of education increasing in other areas not specific to tuition?
 - a. Regent Timmons: The UC feels on campus housing gives the best educational opportunities and are trying to make housing more affordable. Different UCs are taking on different strategies to lower on-campus housing costs.
 - b. Keith: Last year the state committed 1/2 billion dollars for housing to all three sectors (community colleges, UCs, CSUs)

 - Overview: Focused on four areas throughout the internship
 - 1. Philanthropy: Educating the campus community on the importance and impact of Philanthropic work.
 - 2. Engagement: Building meaningful relationships with student leaders on campus.
 - 3. Partnerships: Creating connections with prospective campus partners and supporters.
 - 4. Research: Seeking out resources and opportunities that will establish a solid foundation to expend our reach.
 - Goals
- 1. Alumni Data Procedures: Creating effective policies and processes to ensure alumni information security.
- 2. Student Philanthropy Month: Engaging students and campus partners in the importance of giving back.
- 3. Registered Clubs & Orgs Liaison: Leveraging resources and the network of student leaders and their mission.
- Accomplishments
 - 1. Alumni Data Policy:
 - a. Created an Alumni Data Policy landing page that will house:
 - i. A "Request Alumni" Qualtrics form that was adapted and updated from Jackie Shay's work
 - ii. "Report Alumni Engagement" for staff/faculty to request alumni for events, projects, and programs
 - iii. "Confidentiality Agreement" for staff, faculty, and campus partners to notify them of what data can be released and how to maintain security integrity
 - b. Compiled landing page with the insight from different UC campuses (i.e. UCI and UCSC)
 - i. Adapted UC Santa Cruz Confidentiality Agreement for UC Merced's policy
 - b. Next Steps:
 - i. Roll out new data process to staff and faculty along with the confidentiality agreement
 - 2. Student Philanthropy Month
 - a. Dinner for Champvocates
 - i. Invited 3 alumni non-profit panelist and 2 community partners
 - ii. Engaged 50+ students, provided student-alumni mentorship, and increased SAA interest
 - b. Bobcats Give Back: Day of Service
 - i. Engaged 70+ participants (students, staff, faulty, and alumni) to assist with a Yosemite Lake cleanup
 - c. RCO Crowdfunding Initiative
 - i. Invited all student orgs/clubs to participate in crowdfundraising efforts
 - ii. Worked with 6 organizations to establish and meet fundraising goals for their passion project (in total more than 6k was raised collectively)
 - d. Gratitude & Friendship Fair
 - i. Had more than 100+ students come together
 - e. Game Night
 - i. Opportunity for 6 student orgs who crowdfunded to raise additional funds and further strengthen their community
